FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

The Oregon State Report Card is a summary of Alder Elementary School's academic achievement and growth for the 2014-15 school year. All staff were trained in 2014-15 to use GLAD strategies to integrate literacy into all academic areas. We also used co-teaching models for ELD at all grade levels. During this last year, we adapted our Reading Intervention program to align more-closely with classroom instruction. We saw good growth, at all grade levels, from these changes. In 2015-16, we plan to further enhance this growth by continued emphasis on these principles and providing all of these interventions in the classroom

In professional development for Mathematics, we addressed Common Core State Standards. Professional Development was focused on standards alignment, lesson design, and specific strategies for meeting students' needs. We are working closely with the district to develop and implement a Mathematics Framework, similar to the literacy framework we've used for 2 years, to assist teachers in planning and delivering effective instruction.

A primary focus of our school's efforts this year is on school climate. We know that a positive learning environment is critical to academic success. We are working to reduce behavioral incidents through a focus on inclusion and development of a positive school community. Our goal is on high quality instruction at all levels and to provide academic and behavioral supports for every child. We look forward to working with you to ensure your child's success at


