Reynolds High School Students Excel Through Portland Urban Debate League, Qualify for State Championship Debate Tournament

April 15, 2021, Fairview, OR – Two Reynolds High School students, Destiny Tran and Jeff Cervantes Mendoza, placed first at the Oregon Student Activities Association district debate tournament and will represent the region at the state championship tournament on April 22-24. After several years of dormancy, Reynold's debate program was restarted in the 2019-2020 school year through a partnership with a local nonprofit, Portland Urban Debate League.

"We are proud to see our students excel outside the classroom activities such as debate and appreciate the partnership with the Portland Urban Debate League to make these opportunities available to our students," stated Dr. Danna Diaz, Superintendent of Schools, Reynolds School District.

Tran and Cervantes are now in their second year of competition. This year's debate topic focused on criminal justice reform with students debating both sides of the resolution. When taking the affirmative side of the topic, the debates argued that the United States should eliminate mandatory minimum sentences and expand rehabilitation programs for people leaving prison.

"Debate provides critical skills for students in public policy, effective advocacy, and leadership development, but unfortunately most Portland-area schools no longer offer debate competition," states Jake Weigler, President, Portland Urban Debate League. Weigler added, "We have been honored to be partners with Reynolds to restore this program and pleased to see its competitive success."
