1.	What changes in behavior, actions, policies or practices have you observed related to SIA implementation during the 2021-22 school year? How do you see these changes contributing to the goals and outcomes in your SIA plan? (500 words or less)	SIA has provided the opportunity for our school district to expand its continuum of programming for Student and Family Services. Through the introduction of a Multi-Tiered Integrated Systems of Support lens, there has been direct investment of personnel, mindset, and prioritization of recognizing the collective responsibility of providing scholars a whole child focused education. There has been elevated focus on proactively supporting scholars and the community (trauma informed practices, cultural competency, equity – focused decision making, restorative practices, mental health supports etc.) that was stewarded with the implementation of SIA. These changes provide the foundational investment in paradigm shifting an educational system that had not been designed to factor the barriers that arise within communities due to systemic racism and historical marginalization. With continuous investment, progress monitoring, and implementation support there is revolutionary-sized impact that can occur by continuing to expand the needed supports to dismantle barriers to a scholar's educational dreams.
2.	What barriers or challenges to SIA implementation have you experienced that are helpful for your community and/or state leaders to be aware of? What adjustments, if any, did you make to your SIA plan as a result of these challenges? (500 words or less)	The barriers or challenges would be full integration and prioritization with other school, district, state, and national improvement plans. Integrating the priorities of SIA within the larger organizational improvement plan is necessary for deep change in providing students with what is needed to access their education free of systemic barriers.
