FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

During the 2014-15 school year, the state of Oregon began administering a new state test that is aligned to the recently adopted Common Core State Standards. Because 2014-15 was a transition year, the state has not assigned our school a rating. It is nevertheless evident when we look at the baseline results on the new state test that many of our students have performed well. It is also clear that there is work to be done to increase the scores of others.

On the test of English Language Arts (ELA), nearly 40% of our students met or exceeded the standard. The Oregon Department of Education (ODE) set a target of 54.5% meeting or exceeding. We fell short of that mark and will be instituting a variety of high leverage strategies to help our students make the academic gains in ELA that will ensure that we meet the state target in the 2015-16 school year. Our Mathematics results, while lower than ELA, came closer to our target. 31.5% of our students met or exceeded the state math standard. ODE gave us a target of 40%. We will begin a new mathematics assessment and tracking system this year to better monitor the progress of our students. Our teachers will also undergo training on how to embed recommended math practices into instruction. In the


allocation of building resources, we will maintain a focus on the academic needs of all our students, especially those who struggle.

A key to success is our outreach to parents. We enlist them as partners in the following ways:

- Help them to make sure that students arrive on-time every day.
- Begin a home reading program to ensure that their children read half an hour daily.
- Send home math facts practice routines to build fluency.
- Develop academic goals that are worked on prior to allowing screen time.
- · Encourage regular communication with teachers.
- Invite them to attend school events especially grade level curriculum nights. At Fairview, we know that our students have what it takes to be academically and socially successful. We value the relationships that we forge with families and the community as we endeavor to help every student reach his/her potential.


