For the 2012-13 school year, Hartley Elementary received an overall achievement rating of Level 2 — an average of our Level 3 rating in Reading and a Level 1 rating in Math. While progress is being made, these designations indicate the need for continued refinement in teaching practice and in understanding our students' needs better.

Several academic interventions are underway, and early results are promising. Highlights include:

While we continue to strive for stronger results, Hartley staff remains committed to providing a rigorous, customized educational experience to each and every child.





These schools need additional support in closing the achievement gap among historically underserved student populations.

**Model Schools** are high poverty schools that were ranked in the top 5% of Title I-A schools in the state based on Oregon's rating formula. These schools serve as models of successful student outcomes.
