Course Description. Modern World History encompasses the history of the five major geographical regions of the globe with a special focus on the historical developments and processes that cross multiple regions. The purpose of this course is to explore the history of our world from the late 19th century to the present. You will learn about major world events, the various people, places, and ideas that shaped such events, and how these events directly impact the world we live in today.

Grading Policy:

Your grade will be determined by earning points on traditional homework, classwork, quizzes, essays, and exams. Your final grade will be reported on a traditional A-F scale.

Roughly 25% of your grade will be based on Unit Exams, the rest of your grade will be determined by classwork.
