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Welcome to American Government! I am looking forward to getting to know you and helping you explore how our system of government works.

Required Textbooks/Materials: Our textbook will be Active Classroom, an online resource. Some assignments will be completed online so it is essential that you bring your Chromebook to class each day.

You will need:

- 1) a one subject spiral notebook for notes.
- 2) a **section in a binder** (or a folder) for handouts.
- 3) your **Chromebook**. Bring your Chromebook to class every day.

Course Requirements: Students need to <u>be present and participate</u> <u>actively</u> in class each day. Most class sessions will require a combination of notes taken and participation in an activity or discussion. Students should be checking Schoology daily and completing their assignments. Below is a description of what we will study, but checking Schoology on Monday is the best way to see exactly what we are doing each week.

Course Description: The goal of American Government class is to help students understand the history behind our system of government, how it functions, and how they can participate in it. It meets these state standards:

- 1) Understand the events and thinking that led to the development of American government.
- 2) Describe the key structures and processes established in the Constitution (the executive, legislative and judicial branches).
- 3) Distinguish between the different levels of government (local, state, national).
- 4) Develop an understanding of American foreign policy.
- 5) Examine documents related to the Constitution and key Supreme Court decisions, including those related to Native Americans.
- 6) Identify opportunities for active participation in our political system.
- 7) Analyze an event, issue or problem from varied or opposing viewpoints.

Grading Policy: The following categories will make up your grade.

30%: Assessments and the Final Exam

65%: Classwork (completed during class or independently)

5%: POWER Expectations
