Required Textbooks/Materials:

- 1 Three-ringed binder

- 35mm SLR Film Camera (Not required, we have extra cameras in the classroom, but it would be extremely helpful for students to have their own cameras. Film cameras can be found at thrift stores, goodwill, camera stores, and online: places such as eBay)

Course Description:

Photography 2 allows students to expand their knowledge and skills within the photographic world. It allows students to learn about and explore the wonderful world of Analog Photography. In this class students will learn about 35mm film, how to process it, and how to develop their own images in a darkroom. Students will also gain an understanding of the history of photography, from pre-camera images to modern film masters. This course is a studio based course that will require time spent outside of class.

Course Requirements:

There will be studio based assignments (photographic work) as well as research based assignments (history of photography assignments such as Artist Profiles.)

Participation and attendance is necessary to succeed in this class. Once we begin "in-darkroom" assignments, coming to class prepared and on time will be important as time in the darkroom will be limited.

Grading Policy Description:

Grades will be based on the following: Studio Assignments (50%), Research Assignments(20%), Final Portfolio(20%), and Participation (10%).

Class Expectations:

- Photography Equipment: If you are using the equipment in the photography classroom (Borrowing a camera, using the Mac lab, operating the darkroom, etc.) Please understand that this equipment can be fragile so please be careful when using the equipment.
