FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

2016-17 proved to be another very successful year for RMS on many different fronts. Below, I will highlight a few of the successes:

School wide, RMS students continued to show measurable reading growth; virtually all students achieved at least a year's growth with most students below grade level closing their achievement gap by at least one third.

With additional math intervention classes added, most RMS students showed a year's growth in mathematics.

RMS Spring Parent--Teacher Conferences were attended at a rate of 82%, the highest ever recorded for the school.

RMS had nearly approximately 100 fewer referrals than in the previous year; 87% of students received no disciplinary referrals whatsoever.

The SUN Program served several hundred students after school, offering both academic and enrichment opportunities.

In spite of previous successes we know we need to continue accelerating student growth in both reading and mathematics and are committed to doing so. Thus, we have maintained a master schedule wherein students who need it will have 83 minutes of Language Arts or Reading and 83 minutes of Mathematics daily! Additionally, we have added additional math intervention classes at all three grade levels to further support our students in their

mainstream mathematics courses. We continue to build upon our AVID program (Advancement Via Individual Determination) by adding a fully dedicated AVID Teacher at the 6th grade level. The result is that all 6th grade students will have a semester of AVID. The AVID Program is designed to help put students on a trajectory toward college. This year we are implementing AVID strategies school wide to further support students with reading, writing, and study skills. Finally, recognizing the importance of supporting our students' social/emotional needs and building school community, this year each student will have a Foundations class at the start of the day. The class will be dedicated to building relationships and school culture with the idea that each RMS student will have at least one trusted adult they can turn to for support. We are excited by the possibilities we are able to provide, most importantly helping place each and every student on a path toward college and career readiness.

- · Leveled English Language Development ranging from Newcomers to levels 4-5
- · Comprehensive Special Education supporting students in Reading, Mathematics, Writing, and in their Social/Emotional needs

ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT

Advanced Language Arts and Mathematics are offered to students based on need. 8th grade students who successfully completed Advanced Math receive credit for High School Algebra. AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) is offered at the 6th, 7th and 8th grade levels. The SUN Program (Schools Uniting Neighborhoods) After School Academy provides reading and math intervention, and an extensive list of elective/exploratory offerings based on student interest, including both recreational and competitive soccer.
