- School Profile is meant to provide an overview of the school's most significant characteristics—those aspects that are likely to impact student test scores or other academic outcomes.
- Overall State Rating provides a summary measure of student performance.
- Academic Progress describes the extent to which students are making progress on standards-based tests.
- Outcomes reports key measures of success for all students and student subgroups.
- *Curriculum and Learning Environment* characterizes the school's programs, resources, and additional associated indicators of success.

We are proud to report that Reynolds Middle School students demonstrated the following successes:

- Student subgroups moved out of Focus designation from 2011-12 to 2012-13 school year, indicating progress toward closing student achievement gaps for all students.
- 7th grade students increased reading achievement by 14% on the OAKS State Reading Test.
- 8th grade students increased mathematics achievement by 20% on the OAKS State Math Test.
- Student disciplinary referrals were reduced by 25% from the previous school year.

We are dedicated to increasing student growth and achievement through specific strategies that will help to improve instruction and to empower students to be successful.

RMS students continue to demonstrate academic growth both individually and collectively. We are proud of our efforts to close achievement gaps for our students though we know there is still considerable room for improvement.

Please note some important highlights from your school for the 2012-2013 school year:

- Student disciplinary referrals were reduced approximately 25% from the previous school year.
- Within Oregon's waiver from ESEA (Elementary and Secondary Education Act-formerly known as No Child Left Behind), RMS is

rated a 3 on a scale of 1-5, moving out of school improvement status because of steady academic growth over the last several years.

 We received an overall score of 4 in reading from the state on that same scale.

We continue to be committed to great instruction-for each and every student on our path toward becoming a model middle school in the state and the nation!





These schools generally have overall very low achievement and limited growth over time. Additional supports and interventions to make improvements are needed.

Focus Schools are high poverty schools that were ranked in the bottom 5% -15% of Title I-A schools in the state with a significant achievement gap based on Oregon's rating formula. These schools need additional support in closing the achievement gap among historically underserved student populations.

Model Schools are high poverty schools that were ranked in the top 5% of Title I-A schools in the state based on Oregon's rating formula. These schools serve as models of successful student outcomes.
