- The School Profile which provides an overview of the school's most significant characteristics.
   The aspects that can impact our students test scores or other academic outcomes. A few of the items that our profile includes are enrollment, average class size, demographics and number of different languages spoken.
- The Overall State Rating provides a summary measure of student performance. Our State Rating will compare all the schools state wide and compare our elementary school with similar student demographics schools.
- Our Academic Progress will describe the extent to which students are making progress on standard-based tests. You will be able to see our school progress in Reading, Science and Math, from year to year.
- Our *Outcome* reports will compare Key student groups from our school to same groups statewide in the areas of Reading, Science and Math.
- Curriculum and Learning Environment characterizes the school programs, resources, and
  additional associated indicators of success. This means what our school is doing to improve
  student learning and prepare students for the future.

We are proud to report that Salish Ponds Students and Staff have demonstrated the following successes:

- Overall growth in the area of reading to a level 4 on a scale of 1 to 5.
- Fourth grade had a 9% gain in reading and 4% in math from the previous year.
- Primary classrooms are showing significant growth in the area of reading.
  - o 70% of second graders are reading at grade level
  - o 75% of Kindergarten students are reading CVC words with 80% accuracy.
- Our parent group coordinated two six week sessions of enrichment classes for students.
- We trained over 18 volunteers to support classroom reading instruction.
- Staff collaborated to develop a new mission and vision statement.

We are dedicated to increasing student growth and achievement through specific strategies that will help to improve instruction and to empower student to be successful.

#### FROM THE PRINCIPAL


Dear Parents and Community Members,

**Priority Schools** are high poverty schools that were ranked in the bottom 5% of Title I-A schools in the state based on Oregon's rating formula. These schools generally have overall very low achievement and limited growth over time. Additional supports and interventions to make improvements are needed.

**Focus Schools** are high poverty schools that were ranked in the bottom 5% -15% of Title I-A schools in the state with a significant achievement gap based on Oregon's rating formula. These schools need additional support in closing the achievement gap among historically underserved student populations.

**Model Schools** are high poverty schools that were ranked in the top 5% of Title I-A schools in the state based on Oregon's rating formula. These schools serve as models of successful student outcomes.
