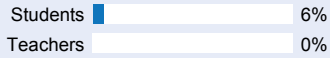

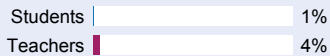

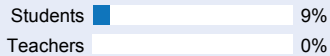

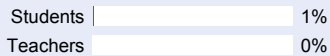

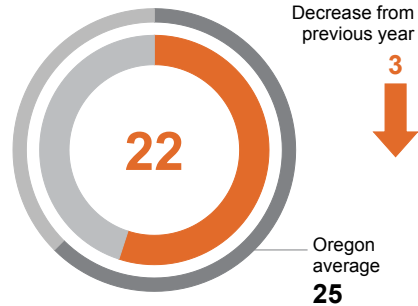

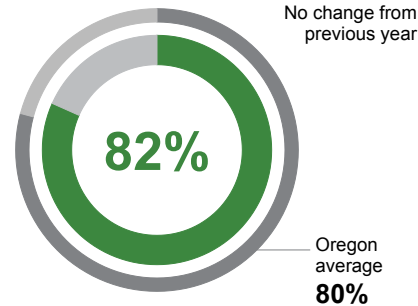

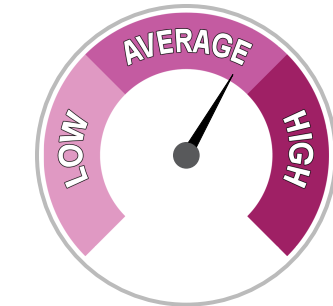
Students who attended more than 90% of their enrolled school days.

INDIVIDUAL STUDENT PROGRESS

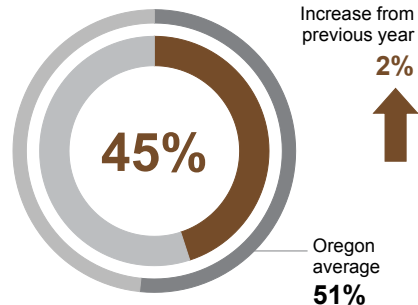
Year-to-year progress in English language arts and mathematics.

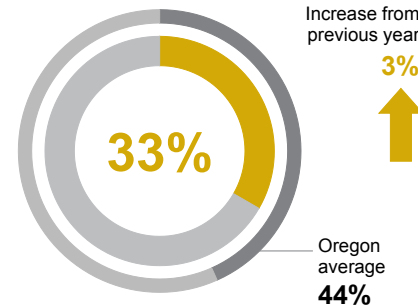
ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

Students meeting state grade-level expectations.



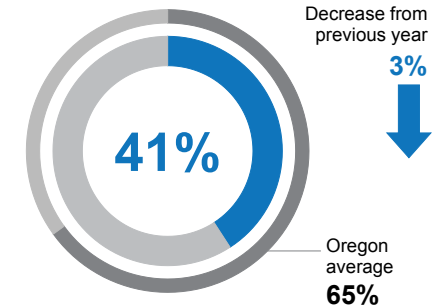
MATHEMATICS

School Goals

We build strong connections with one another, we value listening, and we see differences as assets that make our community stronger. Through intentional and practical application of these core values we have reduced disciplinary action and increased student satisfaction with their school experience. Teachers regularly meet to assess progress and determine how best to move forward, catch up, or accelerate students.

State Goals

The Oregon Department of Education is working in partnership with school districts and local communities to ensure a 90% on-time, four year graduation rate by 2025. To progress toward this goal, the state will prioritize efforts to improve attendance, invest in implementing culturally responsive practices, and promote continuous improvement to close opportunity and achievement gaps for historically and currently underserved students.

Safe & Welcoming Environment

We consider school climate in everything we do, from what we hang on the walls, to how we communicate agreements and norms, to how we provide access to both families and students, and everything in between. We believe it is important that students see themselves represented in the school in as many ways as possible; some example of how we do this include having students do the morning announcements, having them run the assemblies, and contributions to school wide art projects.

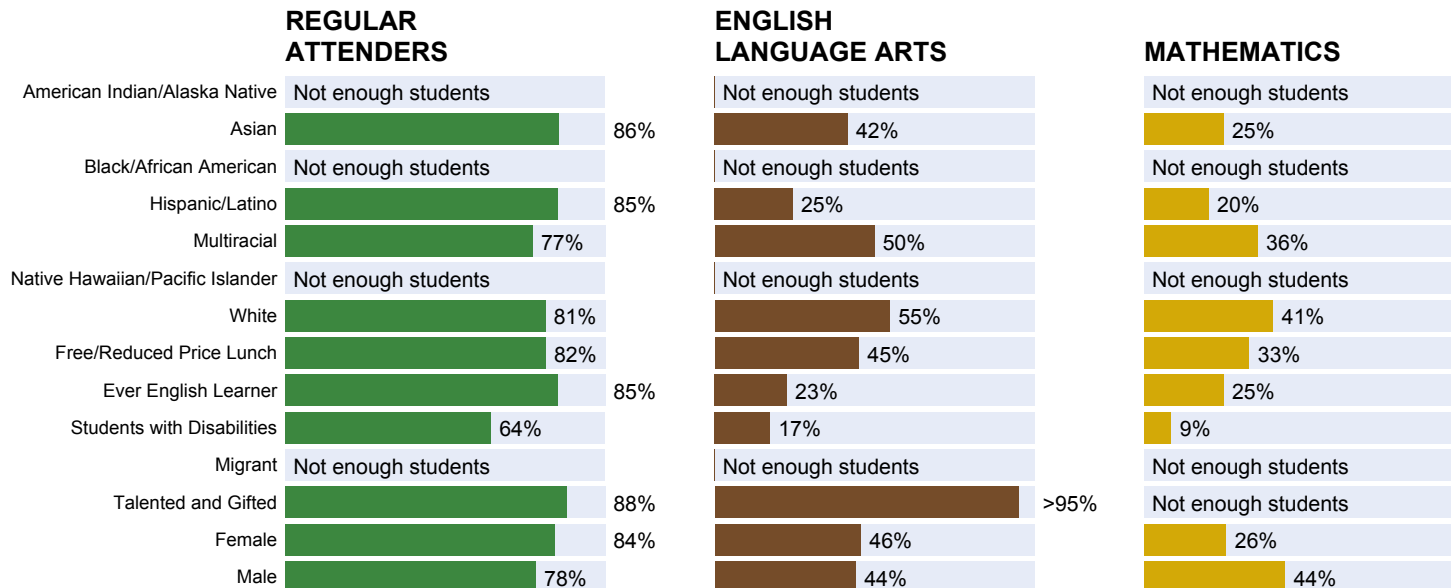

About Our School

BULLYING, HARASSMENT, AND SAFETY POLICIES

We focus on eliminating bullying and harassment by working to prevent it in the first place. We provide daily opportunities for community building, we teach specific lessons on how to prevent bullying from occurring, and we provide students multiple venues to safely/comfortably inform an adult if they are experiencing or witnessing bullying.

If bullying and/or harassment does occur adults intervene to ensure the emotional and physical safety of the students involved.

We monitor and refine our school wide systems to ensure the highest level of safety possible from the moment students step on the school grounds until they leave the school grounds at the end of the day.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

TAG enrichment assemblies are offered through a partnership with OMSII for students that qualify for the program.

Student leadership club meets throughout the year.

Enrichment opportunities are offered to all 4th and 5th grade students during their noon recess period.

PARENT ENGAGEMENT

First we aim to make parents feel as welcome as possible by making ourselves available. We do this by providing multiple paths of communication through clear signage, invitations to give feedback, ask questions, and share concerns as well as hosting family events. We ensure all community signage is in languages represented by our student body families, as well as utilize interpreters for community events, meetings and conferences. We have a robust parent organization and we provide multiple events both at the school and in the neighborhood community center throughout the school year.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

We partner with outside organizations to provide services and enrichment opportunities for our students and families:

- All students benefit from Financial Literacy lessons provided through Junior Achievement
- We experienced a school wide renovation through a community event coordinated by Comcast Cares and United Way
- We benefit from a robust partnership with the EOU's Teacher education program housed at MHCC by way of student teachers throughout the year
- Faith United Methodist church provides food support and volunteers for our Back Pack Buddies Program
- Each year we partner with Pennies for Patients to raise money for Leukemia research
