LANGUAGE: AUDITORY PROCESSING

DID YOU KNOW? (FROM SUPER DUPER PUBLICATIONS)

- Auditory processing is the ability to hear what is being said and the ability to understand it.
- Auditory sequencing is the ability to remember a series of words, sounds, or numbers in the same order that they were spoken.
- Auditory memory is the ability to remember what was said.
- Auditory discrimination is the ability to hear subtle differences in similar sounds. (Ex: Hearing the difference between the words bit and bat.)
- A child with a central auditory processing disorder may have difficulty distinguishing speech from background noises, such as a noisy classroom.
- Often children with auditory processing problems can remember general information but have trouble recalling details.
- Visual cues often help promote attentive listening.
